September 2022

There were 80 incidents reported in your area during September.

05/09/2022 – A drunk visitor was arrested at a property in Hunmanby. Referrals were made to enable the victim to receive support. Officers have since re-visited the property with housing and SBC Community Impact Team to reassure the victim and encourage him to seek support.

 $21/09/2022\ 06:00$ – A report was received from BT that overnight, cables had been intentionally cut from several manholes at the side of Malton Road in Hunmanby. If you see any suspicious activity around manholes in the night, please report ASAP.

21/09/2022 - 12:29 - A resident reports a fraud whereby a Facebook message was received from someone purporting to be one of the victims contacts. They asked for £400 which they needed to release their late wife's bank account. The payment was requested to made by amazon gift cards. It then transpired the friends phone had been hacked the previous week. The victim realised this was a scam – there had since been a further request for £700 in amazon gift cards. These frauds can be very convincing – please always check in person if a friend requests money out of the blue.

24/09/2022 - 22:55 - Officers on patrol on Muston Road stop a vehicle which was being driven in an anti-social manner. The driver and vehicle was issued with a Sec.59 Warning – if they drive in a similar manner again within the next 12 months, then the vehicle can be seized.

It does not matter if no suspects have been seen or cannot be identified; we may have this reported on another nearby incident and be able to link them.

Community Safety Advice October 2022

Here we are in October, the darker nights are drawing in and apart from putting the heating on you should be making sure you home and surrounding property is secure as this is the time of year the burglar likes the best because it's dark and for the most part, we close our curtains to feel a little bit warmer.

There are some great home security measures you could/should take if appropriate -

- Cut down/trim that overgrown hedge and/or bushes from your property.
- Make sure any ladders and tools are locked away securely no point in giving them the tools to enter you home with!
- Make sure you have good outdoor lighting dawn to dusk work just fine, rather than reaction lighting as it gives better coverage of your property and the light shed is constant, not intermittent giving better view around your property
- If you have CCTV, it's a great deterrent as burglars don't like to be seen
- If you can afford one, install a good alarm again, goo deterrent to would-be thieves especially if you have clear signage to advertise!
- One of the better recent additions to home security is a video doorbell so that you can see anyone near your front door (I have one and would not be without now; you really can monitor your property and if like mine you have the option of recording your would-be caller you have evidence should you need it.
- Anything you buy for presents, make sure you keep receipts not for quick returns exactly but as proof of purchase in case you do get burgled, you have the value of the goods and a description to hand.

No-one expects to be burgled and if you are, it leaves a bad taste – I know as I was burgled before I moved to my forever home and precautions were taken at the old property so you can't be too careful!

You don't have to turn your home into Fort Knox but if you take good and tried and tested precautions then you are not only keeping your property secure, but possibly (with the help of your outside lighting) you are helping to keep your neighbours' property safe too.

LATEST SCAM ALERT (s)

TEXT received - £400 utility rebate from the UK Government. You receive a text stating that you should follow this link to a VERY convincing website (which is false) Please DON'T follow the link – it starts by asking which utility provider you use, then your personal details including your bank And you'll not see your money again as they'll empty your account! It's so easy to get distracted – especially when we're all so busy/pre-occupied

If you get such a text, report it to **7726** which is the number for the National Cyber Security Centre and that number holds for any suspicious text you receive. Once you have forwarded the text, don't forget to block the sender, and then delete it

Parcel texts – we've all had these as well, haven't we? Sadly, they are still doing the rounds, "We've tried to deliver your package and you were not in, so a further fee is payable" (or similar wording). The second you follow the link, it's asking for your bank details, your name and address ... you know how it goes so please, give yourself 5 (five) seconds to think about what you might hastily do - - forward the text to 7726, block the number and then delete it.
