## June 2023

There were 146 incidents reported in your area during June.

**23/06/2023** - Police are appealing for witnesses following a fatal collision near to Forge Valley Wood on Seavegate, East Ayton. The collision happened on Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> June at around 8.40pm near to the Scout hut and the Old Man's Mouth car park and involved red Vauxhall Corsa which was travelling in the direction of East Ayton. Very sadly the driver, an 18-year-old man, died at the scene.

Officers are appealing for any witnesses to the collision, or anyone who saw the vehicle prior to the collision to contact them. They'd particularly like to speak to any drivers in the area who may have captured dash cam footage. 01/06/2023 14:37 – Officers attended a two vehicle minor injury RTC on A165 just south of Reighton. They assisted with clearing the scene before being diverted to an urgent incident near Eastfield.

03/06/2023 03:01 – Officers on route to an immediate grade incident at Primrose Valley discover a drink driver which was completely unrelated to the original incident. The driver was arrested and take to Scarborough custody, a unit from Scarborough was dispatched to the job at Primrose Valley. The drink driver was later charged with this offence, they appeared at Scarborough Magistrates Court on 19/06/23 where they received a 12 month driving ban.

13/06/2023 09:11 – Hunmanby Parish Council report that between 08/06/23 and 09/06/23, fencing on Priest Close worth £300 has been ripped down to make dens, there was no CCTV available.

22/06/2023 07:21 – A vehicle was reported to have crashed overnight into a garden on Sands Road. The driver has been located and an investigation into the circumstances is ongoing.

23/06/2023 12:43 – Hunmanby Parish Council report that the previous evening at Bowling Green Lane outside the school, some children have chopped down a "healthy, big, mature tree" belonging to the parish council. The children were reported to have built a den with the tree. Local Officers have attended and removed a hand saw from the location.

24/06/2023 18:26 – An off-road motor bike without a number plate made off from Police Officers on Park Rise in Hunmanby. The only description possible was the biker was wearing black and green. Please report any information relating to this and quote incident 12230116724.

26/06/2023 14:18 – An RTC was reported at Royal Oak whereby a resident returned and found a car in his front garden. All the relevant details were exchanged between the driver and house owner.

28/06/2023 16:40 - Hunmanby Parish Council report that the previous evening between 2045hrs and 2130hrs at Bowling Green Lane, two youths caused £100 of damage to a fence.

30/06/2023 22:53 – A report was received from Hunmanby of youths gathering behind the garages near Priest Close. Officers attended and conducted an area search but no youths could be located.

**Change to front office opening times** - Due to staffing difficulties, the front counter hours of both Filey and Eastfield Police Station are changing for the next 3 months. Filey will be open 0900-1500 every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Eastfield will be open 0900-1500 every Tuesday and Thursday.

During June we dealt with 863 incidents across the area as a whole, a breakdown of these follows (not inclusive of all incidents): -

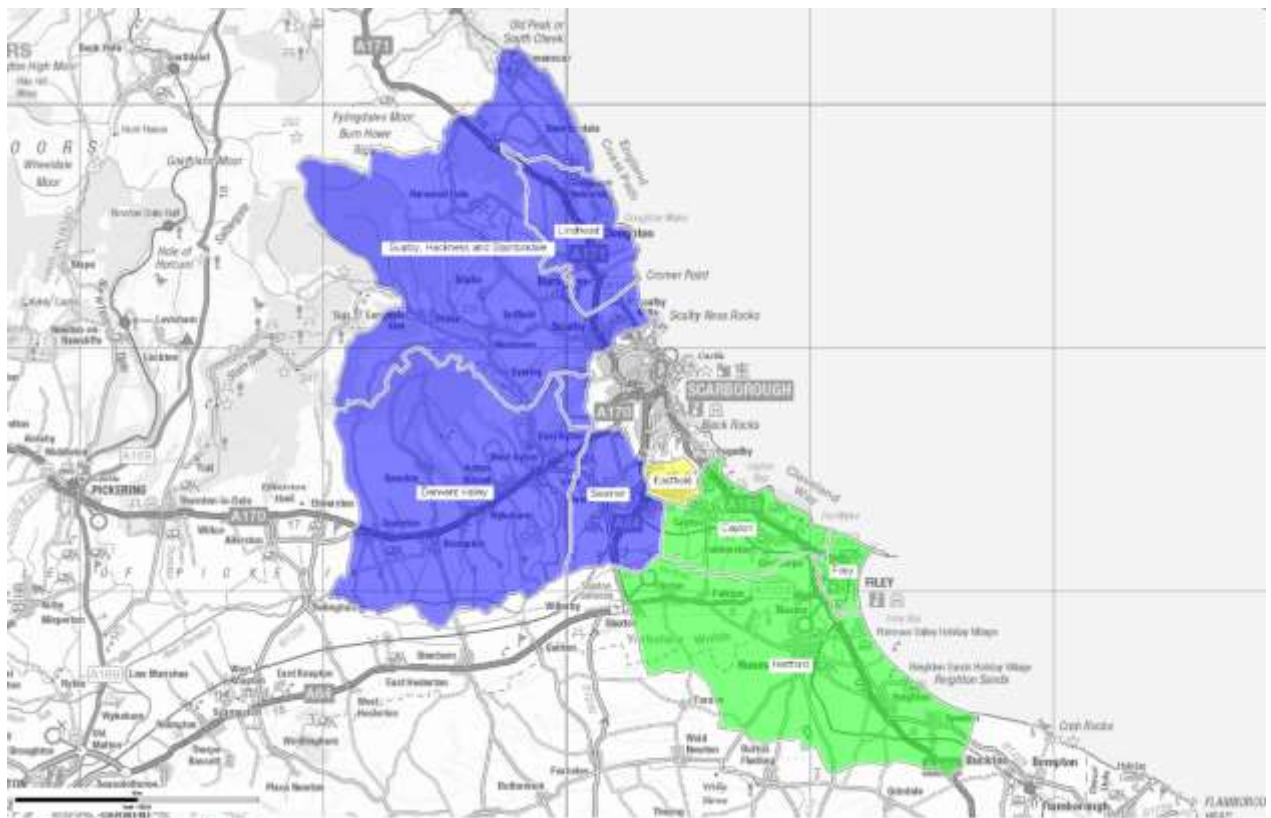

- 59 violence crimes.
- 7 sexual offences.
- 15 thefts.
- 1 stolen motor vehicle.
- 8 fraud or forgery.
- 5 drug offence.
- 29 criminal damages.
- 4 dwelling or commercial burglaries.
- 0 auto crimes.
- 75 anti-social behaviour reports.

# Community Safety Advice – July 2023

## 🎤 🎵 “We’re all Going on a Summer Holiday” 🎵 🎤

We all know to keep our windows and doors locked while we are at the back of our property – goes without saying.

But what about when you go away on holiday?      Have a check list

- Cancel newspapers.
- Cancel milk (if delivered)
- Ensure any scheduled deliveries of orders don’t get delivered while away or work out alternative destinations by asking a neighbour if they will take delivery for you
- Lock all windows and secure doors (including outbuildings).
- If you have a system fitted, ensure you mobile is synchronised to accept home security updates while you are away
- Make a list before you go away of all the documents you need to take with you.

### Your Property and Security

Well, it is that time of year again where we are all busy bees outside our properties in the garden either weeding or painting the fence or having a barbeque with family and friends so it’s time for reminders to keep your valuables out of sight and secure.

It’s a regular dinner meal for the would-be thief if we let our guard down and leave windows and doors wide open to “blow away the cobwebs” – but, that’s playing into their hands, and if there are a lot of people milling about (if you have a barbeque for example) it not possible to keep tabs on everyone - so we must be careful and be security conscious.

So, look at your property like it is the layers of an onion (or a rose if you prefer) and start on the outside/fencing. Are your gates secure, have you holes in your fence or hedge? If you have a hole, then try to “plug” it with something you don’t use as this is leaving yourself vulnerable if you don’t (thieves can crawl through a gap in a hedge to gain access to your property).

Outbuildings next – are your locks secure? Do you have CCTV pointing at the access of your property (being careful not to break any regulations!) and are the things inside your outbuildings secure? If not, invest in a padlock or two



With diesel being the price that it is and thefts on the rise, we need to tighten up security on the oil tanks and bowsers!

- Placing lockable caps on your tank’s fill point and inspection chamber is the easiest method to prevent fuel from being siphoned out of the tank’s access points. **This is very important as instances of diesel theft are increasing in our area.**
- Consider protecting vulnerable hoses with stronger casing to ensure they are harder to cut by a thief.
- Most electronic fuel tank monitors can be fitted to most tanks. Some oil monitors even can set off an audible alarm if the oil level in tank were to suddenly drop below the expected level or if the system detects considerable tank movement or vibration that may be caused because of tank drilling or spiking.

- Fuel dye can act as a deterrent as the Police can easily identify if fuel has stolen. Criminals will be forced to consider whether it's worth stealing fuel that is protected and easily identifiable, it also makes the fuel more difficult to sell on. Some haulage firms in the UK now use fuel dye specifically so any stolen fuel can be traced back to their companies, as fuel can be their biggest expense to their business and thus warrants being protected by any means.
- Ensuring that your premises have high quality security lighting that makes your fuel tank and vehicles visible to passers-by is a strong deterrent to an opportunistic fuel thief.
- You can also consider installing PIR Sensors and other types of security lights, these measures can quickly make a thief change their mind about targeting your tank.

**CARAVANS and MOTOR HOMES** – whether parked on your driveway or placed on a site, you need to think about your security there too; ensure that if you are leaving your caravan unattended for any length of time that you put all items away out of sight and that you have good sturdy locks on the towbar and also put a wheel clamp on one of the wheels..... make it as hard as you can for a would-be thief as they prefer “easy pickings”.

So, all of the above are guidelines for you to follow to keep yourself and your belongings safe and sound.
